90 and Robin Alcantara Calcagno Homes The Yonkers Housing Authority and YonkersArts announced that a partnership to bring public art to YHA now entering its third year has so far added more than 150 pieces of art to seven authority properties.

The milestone was celebrated with the unveiling of an incredible mural at the gym at Calcagno Homes on Jan. 23 done by Yonkers' artist, Robin Alcantara of the artist collective, BLAZAY.

And in 2023, plans to add even more artwork to YHA properties.

From colorful murals to framed watercolors, oils and pen and ink drawings, artwork has been installed at properties across the housing authority.

The Yonkers Housing Authority manages 1,700 units of housing in addition to administering more than 5,000 vouchers through its Housing Choice Voucher Program, providing affordable housing.

The project is the 'brain-child' President CEO Wilson Kimball who believes in the power of art to inspire.

"Not only does looking at beautiful art make us feel better by raising our serotonin levels, it can also increase blood flow which increases brain function. Art is not only beautiful, but it is also beneficial to our health," said Kimball.

The Mulford Corporation, which raises funds to supplement the housing authority programs, voted to allocate \$100,000 to commission Yonkers Arts to coordinate the project using local artists and artists of color.

Within the year, Yonkers Arts was able to execute art installations at the following properties: Walsh Houses, Calcagno Homes, Charles L. Curran Court, Kris Kristensen Homes, John E. Flynn Manor, Martinelli Manor, and finally, Monsignor Troy Manor.

Each property now features a curated art activation that is beautiful and also serves to improve the daily living experience of residents. For example, Walsh Road Senior housing now has sound panel 'sculptures' that are not only attractive but have the practical benefit of reducing noise.

"Yonkers Arts believes that art is multifaceted and can break down barriers. Through exploring multiple techniques and mediums, this project allowed us to understand the needs of each resident to enhance their living experiences. It also had the benefit of bringing a cohort of diverse and local artists directly to these communities. Something extremely important to the organization."

Biagio Civale Artist, Sculpture Brings His Work to YHA
