A Letter from Wilson Kimball



It's okay to ask for help.

Recently I spoke to Kelly Chiarella at the City of Yonkers (COY) Office for the Aging (OFA) about

some of the challenges our collective clients are facing. We speak often about our efforts to help seniors because seniors are a growing percentage of the population not just in Yonkers and in Westchester but also across New York State. That is in part because seniors are living longer which can create economic, health and mental health stressors on family and friends. Given these stressors we understand that no one group of people can care for our aging population so it's ok to ask for help. We can help you!

Kelly and I have noticed several trends. First, as seniors age they develop more anxieties. Whether it is a fear of bugs, moving residences or physical limitations due to declining health. These anxieties create an inability to act, to move forward. Everyone can feel

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overwhelmed at times. It's ok to ask for help. Our resident coordinators are here to help you.

Another trend is struggling to make ends meet. We see it when someone loses their partner, when someone loses a benefit or because of the current increased cost of living. Everything we consume has gone up in price. But not all the benefits offered, or wages paid can keep up with that inflation. Monetary struggles can create anxiety, lead to a sense of powerlessness and frustrate anyone. It's ok to ask for help. If we don't know the answer, we will find someone who does.

Lastly, you may have questions. You may not understand why your rent has gone up or down. You may have a question about parking, is it available or how much does it cost? You may wonder why you must recertify your income every year or why you must do it for the IRS and HUD. Our staff is extremely busy every day trying to help people just like you. If you have a question call or e-mail us. We are happy to help. So please ask us, it's ok. We are there for you.

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Kara Magoolaghan, and other MHACY staff. The tour began at La Mora, the pioneering modular Passive House senior building slated to open in Spring 2024, where we were joined by Mayor Mike Spano and MHACY Board Vice Chair Denise Egiziaco.

After learning about the innovative steps that Yonkers is undertaking to create resilient and healthy new buildings, the group visited two legacy public housing sites recently redeveloped under HUD's RAD and Section 18 programs — Loehr Court and Palisade Towers. At Loehr Court, HUD toured the boiler rooms which severely flooded in 2021 during Hurricane Ida, which continue to sustain severe flooding during heavy rain events.

Groundwork Hudson Valley, a nonprofit partner of MHACY, spoke about the green infrastructure upgrades planned on the properties and the many ways that the partnership is promoting equity and youth leadership. At Palisade, the tour learned about MHACY's goals to decarbonize and electrify the 7-acre property which houses over 400 families to combat the continuing battle of increasing costs due to antiquated building infrastructure systems.

The tour concluded at the Ridgeway development, which sits at the former Cottage Place Gardens public housing site. A product of a decade-long partnership with The Community Builders, Ridgeway serves as an inspirational example of a successful and beautiful affordable housing development, serving more than 400 low-income families in Yonkers. The all-electric buildings benefit from substantial resiliency measures including rooftop solar and emergency generator power, as well as social programming including an on-site day care facility. Ridgeway VI, the sixth and final phase of the site, is currently in development, and will create 92 new senior apartments that meet rigorous energy efficiency standards of Passive House certification.

MHACY was thrilled to welcome HUD to Yonkers, showcasing the many ways that the Yonkers Housing Authority is preserving affordability while striving to meet the future needs for new, resilient affordable housing.
